WE, THE PEOPLE OF INDIA,

having solemnly resolved to constitute India into a

SOVEREIGN SOCIALIST SECULAR DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC

and to secure to all its citizens

JUSTICE, social, economic and political;

LIBERTY of thought, expression, belief, faith and worship;

EQUALITY of status and of opportunity;

and to promote among them all FRATERNITY,

assuring the dignity of the individual

and the unity and integrity of the Nation -

in our Constituent Assembly

this 26th day of November, 1949, do hereby

ADOPT, ENACT AND GIVE TO OURSELVES THIS CONSTITUTION.

ST. FRANCIS XAVIER, PATRON OF OUR COLLEGE

- Born on 07.04.1506 at Navarre, Spain
- Graduated from the Sorbonne University of Paris and later became a professor in the same University
- Met St. Ignatius of Loyola in the University campus in Paris and raised questions about the ultimate aim of human life
- Became one of the Founders of the Society of Jesus
- Reached Goa, India, on 06.05.1542
- From 1542 traversed the length and breadth of the coastal regions of Tamil Nadu to share the "Good News"
- Passed away on 03.12.1552 at Sancian Island while journeying towards China
- Body brought to Goa on 16.03.1554
- Canonized on 12.03.1622.
- Even today his body is kept incorrupt in Goa and venerated by millions of devotees
- In 2006, 500 years of his birth was celebrated all over the world.
- In March 2022 the 400th year of his canonisation was celebrated.

THE SOCIETY OF JESUS (S.J.)



The Founder of the Society of Jesus St. IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA, born in 1491, was the last child of a large Basque family in Spain. The name LOYOLA came from the ancestral castle that was the family heritage. Ignatius was trained to arms and to the etiquette of court life. He enlisted himself in the border wars with France and was badly wounded in a

battle in 1521. As he lay convalescing at Loyola, he read the Gospel narratives and the Lives of Saints and was inspired to follow Christ by giving up all worldly ambitions and trappings of power and embracing a life of poverty, sacrifice and service after the example of his saintly mentors.

He began this new life at the age of 31. He spent a year of severe penance and intense prayer in a solitary cave on the banks of the river Cardoner near the town of Manresa in Spain.

Exercises, which became the soul and centre, the rule and charter of every Jesuit who came after him. Reflecting on the crisis in the Church of his time, he felt that the need of the hour was for learned and holy priests who were ready to serve the poor and to give witness to the love of Christ for men. To achieve this objective he set himself in right earnest to study from grammar school to college and university in the various Spanish centres of learning and finally took his Master's Degree from the Sorbonne University, Paris. At the same time, he won over a group of brilliant and like-minded university men (one of whom was St. Francis Xavier), moulded them by the Spiritual Exercises and welded them into a religious fraternity which soon became the Society of Jesus. In course of time, the members of the society came to be known popularly as Jesuits.

The Jesuits

The Society of Jesus is a world-wide organisation of religious men, numbering about 16,000 spread all over the world, of whom nearly 4000 are working in the 19 provinces and 2 regions of India. In Tamil Nadu alone there are around 500 Jesuits working in schools and colleges, youth services and social work

centres, in parishes and in mission outreach programmes and in almost any and every form of service and ministry of the Church.

Jesuit Education - New Orientation

Jesuit Education in the Madurai Province (Tamil Nadu) today draws its inspiration from the two epoch - making statements, viz, the Vision Statement and Preamble to Jesuit Higher Education, that originated in the Madurai Province Meet of 1984.

Excerpts from the Vision Statement (Updated from the latest statement)

- "We understand that the contemporary equivalent of the mission of salvation is the integral liberation of man which is crystallised for us today in an ardent desire to work towards liberation together with the poor."
- "The preferential option for the poor means that we cast our lot with them through concerted social action. Our love is, indeed, for all human beings, but it assumes different forms. We love the oppressed by espousing their cause and we love the oppressor by emancipating him from his greed and domination which dehumanize him."

Excerpts from the Preamble to Jesuit Higher Education 1918

• Inspired by the Christian values of joy, love, peace, and justice and guided by the characteristics of Jesuit Education, we, the Jesuits in Higher Education, resolve to liberate the marginalized from the unjust social structures. We want to empower the marginalized by making quality education available for them. Our higher educational institutions will strive to promote teaching-learning, extension, evaluation, promotion of Ignatian values and spirituality, and an eco - conscious campus, leading to integrated growth of the human person. We will try to make our students internalize the Ignatian concept of Magis and seek quality and excellence, so that they become competent in knowledge, skills and attitude, rooted in compassion towards the poor and committed to the creation of a just world.

Excerpts from the Document of General Congregation 34

• "We recognize that universities remain crucial institutional settings in Society. For the poor, they serve as major channels for social advancement. In and through universities important debates take place about ethics, future directions of economics and politics and the very meaning of human existence that shape our culture".

Excerpts from the Document of General Congregation 35

- The complexity of the problems we face and the richness of the opportunities offered demand that we engage in building bridges between the rich and the poor, establishing advocacy links of mutual support between those who hold political power and those who find it difficult to voice their interests. Our intellectual apostolate provides an inestimable help in setting up these bridges, offering us new ways of understanding in depth the mechanisms and links among our present problems. Many Jesuits in educational, social promotion and research institutions, together with others engaged directly with the poor, are already committed to this work.
- This congregation urges all Jesuits and all partners engaged in the same mission, particularly the universities and research centres, to continue promoting studies and practices focusing on the causes of poverty and the improvement of the environment. We should find ways in which our experiences with refugees, the poor, and the displaced on the one hand, and people who work for the protection of the environment on the other hand, could interact with those institutions so that our research and advocacy would be of practical benefit to society and to the environment.

Excerpts from the Document of General Congregation 36

We recognize the signs of God's work, of the great ministry of reconciliation God has begun in Christ... Rather than ask what we should do, we seek to understand how God invites us – and so many people of good will – to share in that great work. (Decree 1, #3]

Discernment, collaboration and networking offer three important perspectives on our contemporary way of proceeding. [Decree 2, #3]

Discernment: This serves as the foundation for decision - making by the proper authority in our way of proceeding. Consistent and participative discernment is our way of ensuring that ongoing apostolic planning, including implementation, monitoring and evaluation, is an integral element in all Jesuit ministry. Collaboration: GC36 expresses its gratitude to all those who contribute to and play significant roles in Jesuit ministry. That mission is deepened and ministry is extended by collaboration among all with whom we work, especially those inspired by the Ignatian call. {Decree 2, #6]

Networking: Collaboration naturally leads to cooperation through networks. New technologies of communication open up forms of organization that facilitate collaboration. When properly conceived, networking provides a healthy balance between authority and local initiative. It strengthens local capacity and encourages subsidiarity while assuring a unified sense of mission from a central authority. [Decree 2, #8]

We walk neither by ourselves nor for our own comfort; we walk with a heart that does not rest, that does not close in on itself but beats to the rhythm of a journey undertaken together with all the people faithful to God. Let us walk by making ourselves all things to all people by seeking out someone to help. [Pope Francis, addressing the Delegates of GC 36, Oct. 24, 2016]

ST. XAVIER'S COLLEGE A CENTURY OF ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A HISTORICAL SKETCH

St. Xavier's College is run by the Society of St. Francis Xavier, a body registered under the Societies Registration Act, (S.No.3 of 1920 - 21) having its office at Palayamkottai. In 1923 French Jesuit missionaries started this college in Palayamkottai which was once considered poor and backward. Already a Jesuit School had been functioning for nearly 50 years in this place. The Jesuit trio, the select task force, responsible for the founding of the College were Fathers Mahe, Lebeau and Bonhoure. Their zeal had created a tradition of academic excellence and universal service. Fathers Adrian Caussanel, Gnanapragasam and Dhanasamy played leading roles in the founding and early development of the College.

St. Xavier's College is a sylvan historian, telling a tale of sublime vision, supreme sacrifice, academic excellence and intense humanism. Established at Palayamkottai in 1923 by Jesuit Fathers of Madurai Province (Fr. Adrian Caussanel S.J., Fr. Mahe S.J., Fr. Lebeau S.J., and Fr. Bonhoure S.J.) with an aim of preparing generations of students who should become "men and women for others," St. Xavier's College has followed the policy of inclusive education. Learning at St. Xavier's College has always been student - centric. The academic year 2022 -2023 being the centenary year, the yearlong celebrations began on 2nd July 2022 with a Mini - Marathon in the morning and the 96th Graduation Ceremony in the afternoon. The Inaugural Function was held on 9th September 2022. The Centenary Logo focuses on "Reminisce, Rejoice, Radiate." We like to reflect on the past and rejoice because we are standing in a long line of tradition which began one hundred years ago. It is also the time for us to radiate, keeping the vision and mission of our institution.

The College became autonomous in 1987. St. Xavier's College was one of the 47 colleges selected at the national level by the UGC for the status of "College with Potential for Excellence" in September 2004. The college has successfully completed three phases of the status of "College with Potential for Excellence".

Since its inception, St. Xavier's College has continued to grow academically and has expanded through the introduction of new infrastructure facilities. The NAAC Peer Team visited the College on 26th and 27th August 2019 for the fourth cycle and accredited the College at "A++" Grade with a CGPA of 3.66 out of 4. Under the new assessment system introduced by NAAC in July 2017, St. Xavier's College got the first place among all the higher education institutions in Tamil Nadu. This is a significant milestone in the history of St. Xavier's College.

St. Xavier's College, which had 25 intermediate students in 1923, has moved from strength to establish exemplary landmarks in all domains, including academics, research, extra-curricular activities and outreach programmes. At present our college consists of 247 teaching staff, 117 non-teaching staff and 4600 students.

It is a matter of great pride for the Xaverian Family that over the last one hundred years of its glorious presence, St. Xavier's College has charted a distinguished path to emerge as an institution of great eminence at the national level. The alumni of St. Xavier's College such as Former Justice S. Ratnavel Pandian, Justice S. S. Sundar, Justice S. M. Subramaniam, Prof. K. R. Srinivasa Iyengar, Former Vice-Chancellor of Andhra University, Dr. W. Selvamurthy, Chancellor of Amity University, Dr. K. P. Aravanan, Former Vice-Chancellor of Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Dr. K. Pitchumani, Former Vice-Chancellor of Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Dr. P. Manisankar, Former Vice-Chancellor of Bharathidasan University, Dr. P. Ramasamy, Former Vice-Chancellor of Alagappa University, Rev.Bro. M. Velankanni, Superior General, Brothers of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, Dr. Jebamalai Vinanciarachi, Former Advisor, UNIDO, Mr. Vaiko, M.P., Mr. Su. Thirunavukarasar, Former M.P., Mr. S. Peter Alphonse, Former Chairman of State Minorities Commission, Tamil Nadu, Mr. M. Malik Feroz Khan, Former Collector of Thoothukudi District, Mr. D. Prakash, ADGP of Police, Uttar Pradesh, Mr. K. Murugan, Former Secretary General, Volleyball Federation of India, Mr. Valampuri John, Former M.P., and Mr. Vijay Antony, Actor cum Music Director, have brought laurels to our institution.

We wanted our centenary year to be a chance to pause and reflect on our past and also be a time to look forward with the Ignatian principle of MAGIS.

CHRONOLOGY OF EVENTS

- 1923 St. Xavier's College was founded with 25 students in the Intermediate class.
- 1925 The College became a First grade College of the Madras University. B.A. Mathematics and History were started.
- 1932 B.A. Economics was started. Strength of the College crossed 300.
- 1936 Xavier Block of the Xavier Hostel was built.
- 1948 Silver Jubilee of the College. Britto Hostel was built.
- 1955 The Second floor of the main building was constructed. B.Sc. Chemistry was started.
- 1956 B.Sc. Physics was introduced. The Lebeau Auditorium and Library building were completed.
- 1957 B.Sc. Zoology was started.
- The most beautiful structure in the Campus, the College Church, blending Saracenic and Dravidian architectures, was constructed and blessed.
- 1962 The college stadium was built.
- 1965 Additional block for Britto Hostel was built.
- 1966 The College came under the newly created Madurai Kamaraj University. The total strength rose to 1000.
- 1968 B.A. English Literature and B.Com. were started.
- 1969 Two science blocks were constructed by adding extensions to the main building.
- 1970 B.Sc. Botany and M.Sc. Mathematics were started.
- 1971 The strength of the College crossed 2000. M.A. Tamil was started.
- 1975 Golden Jubilee was celebrated.
- 1979 M.Sc. Zoology was started. For the first time, Catholic girls were admitted to the Post Graduate courses.

- 1981 The Department of Tamil became a research department.
- 1982 Entomology Research Unit was founded.
- The College completed 60 years of fruitful service.

 M.Sc. Botany and M.Phil. Tamil were started.
- 1984 Centre for Biodiversity and Biotechnology (CBB) was founded.
- 1985 The Department of Zoology became a research department.
- 1986 B.Sc. Computer Science, M.Phil. Mathematics in aided stream and M.Phil. Zoology in self finance stream were started.
- 1987 The College became an autonomous institution. M.A. Folklore was started and the Folklore Resources and Research Centre (FRRC) was founded.
- 1988 M.Com. was started.
- 1990 The College was affiliated to the newly created Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli, and was the only Men's College of the University that was autonomous.
- 1991 PGDCA course was started.

 University Review Committee visited the college for extension of autonomy.
- The Department of Folklore was recognised as a research department.
- 1993 The Department of Botany became a research department.

 STAND, the outreach programme, was made an integral component of curriculum.

 University Review Committee visited the college for extension of autonomy.
- The Plantinum Jubilee Block was completed.M.Sc. Computer Science in self finance was started.
- 1995 Campus Diversity Initiative Programme was introduced.
 UGC Review Committee visited the college for extension of autonomy.
- 1996 Diversified Curriculum and B.Com. Vocationalisation in Computer Applications were launched.

Centre for Aquaculture Research & Extension (CARE) was founded.

- 1997 Platinum Jubilee Tournaments were started.
- 1998 Platinum Jubilee was celebrated.

B.Sc. Comp. Science and B.Com. Evening Courses were started. Aquatic Biodiversity Centre was founded. Crop Protection Research Centre was founded.

University Review Committee visited (midterm) the college for extension of autonomy.

The College was nationally assessed and accredited with five stars by NAAC.

M.C.A. was started. Centre for Aquafeed and Nutrition (CAFeN) was founded. UGC Review Committee visited the college for extension of autonomy.

- 2001 Fr. K. A. Soosai Memorial Block was inaugurated. Library automation was completed. Plant Molecular Biology Research Unit was founded.

COAT OF ARMS

The three branches of palm leaves on the right side of the emblem signify that our institution is situated in Tirunelveli District. The ear of rice corn arched on the left side of the emblem represents Maruthanilam. The local symbols connected by a cross highlight the fact that ours is a Christian Institution. At the top of the cross, the college motto, Veritate Lumen et Vita (Light and Life through Truth) is



inscribed. The shield at the front of the cross, has two divisions. On the right IHS, the Jesuit motto, is inscribed. The squares on the left indicate the spiritual, moral, emotional and intellectual development that education fosters in a person. The emblem thus means that St. Xavier's College is a Jesuit institution of higher learning established in Tirunelveli District for the all-round development of its pupils.

NATURE AND AIM

The Jesuit College aims at the training of young men and women of quality to be leaders in all walks of life so that they may serve the people of our nation in truth, justice and love. Accordingly, this College is to be an agent of social change, instilling in the youth an awareness of the great need in our country of social justice based on brotherhood and dignity of the human person. Thus it aims at making its own contribution towards a transformation of the present social condition so that justice, equality and the moral values enshrined in the Constitution of India may prevail in the daily life of every citizen.

The aim of St. Xavier's is the sound formation (religious, intellectual, social and physical) of the young based on Christian principles. Every student is required, therefore to attend Catholic Doctrine (for Catholics) or Ethics (for others) classes, and classes on Social Analysis and Personality Development through which students are motivated to such sound formation and integral growth. They are also expected to take part in the extension service programmes organised by the College.

AUTONOMY

In recognition of its service and to increase its efficiency still further, autonomy has been conferred on St. Xavier's College with effect from June 1987. In the autonomous system, this College is free to design the course pattern, frame its own syllabi for the various courses and adopt suitable methods of teaching and evaluation. The College is an affiliated First Grade College of the Manonmaniam Sundaranar University which will award degrees with the name of St. Xavier's College mentioned on the certificate. In August 2019, UGC Expert Committee visited St. Xavier's College and extended Autonomy from 2019 to 2024, including ex-post-facto approval for 2018-2019.

ACCREDITATION BY NAAC

NATIONAL ASSESSMENT AND ACCREDITATION COUNCIL (NAAC) assessed and accredited the college in 2000 and awarded FIVE STAR GRADE in the first cycle. NAAC assessed the college in the second cycle and awarded "A" Grade in 2006. NAAC accredited the college in the third cycle at "A" Grade with a CGPA of 3.50 in 2012. Based on the accreditation in the first three cycles MHRD classified the institutions into high performing institutions and extended the validity of Accreditation period from 5 years to 7 years in respect of high performing institutions. The college was one among the few institutions which enjoyed the privilege of getting the extension of the validity period of NAAC accreditation from five years to seven years for third cycle. NAAC assessed and accredited the college under the Revised Accreditation Framework (RAF) at "A++" Grade with a CGPA of 3.66 out of 4 in 2019 in the fourth cycle with the validity period of 7 years. It was a proud moment to note that the college received the highest score among the Arts and Science Institutions category in September 2019 under the new RAF introduced by NAAC in July 2017.

COLLEGE WITH POTENTIAL FOR EXCELLENCE

UGC conferred on our College the status of "College with Potential for Excellence" in 2004 and for the second cycle in 2010. UGC extended the status of College with Potential for Excellence (CPE) for the third phase in 2014.

DBT STAR COLLEGE SCHEME

The Department of Bio-technology, Government of India, selected our college under Star College Scheme in 2014 and for the second time in 2017. This scheme aims at strengthening the scientific knowledge and skills of the students in five Science Departments.

DST - FIST SCHEME

The Department of Biotechnology, Government of India, granted fund to establish state of the art facilities for teaching and research in the science departments under DST-FIST (Level 0) scheme from 2018.

CHOICE - BASED CREDIT SYSTEM

While the Tamil Nadu State Council of Higher Education (TANSCHE) came forward to introduce CBCS in all the affiliated colleges in Tamil Nadu in June 2008, St. Xavier's College had already introduced CBCS as early as June 2002 for UG courses and in June 2003 for PG courses. The aim of the Choice Based Credit System is to provide ample choice of subjects to students, based on the weighted credit point system. This system offers the learners a chance to match their aptitude and interest with the subjects of their choice and learn at their own pace. Thus St. Xavier's College gives every student an opportunity to study his / her respective course and pursue other courses from any other discipline simultaneously.

TANSCHE SYLLABUS

The Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSCHE) introduced common syllabus throughout the state in the academic year 2023 - 24. The syllabus of St. Xavier's College was modified in June 2023 as per the guidelines given by TANSCHE.

OBJECTIVES OF THE RESTRUCTURED CURRICULUM

The academic programme for the UG course has the following general objectives:

CREDITS

Every paper of study is allotted a particular number of hours per week, based on which credits are allotted. The successful completion of a paper enables a student to gain the full credit for that paper. A student must earn a minimum of 140 credits to get his / her UG degree. He / She may choose extra credit courses to earn more credits. It is also mandatory that every student involves himself / herself in at least one of the extra - curricular activities for earning one credit under part V. Four credits are allotted to NCC.

ADDITIONAL COMPULSORY COURSES

In order to cater to the diverse needs of students, some compulsory courses are offered by the College. During their first year, all the students should learn one "Add - On course" offered by the respective departments. Similarly II year UG students should study one "Value - Added course". These courses are of minimum 30 hours duration followed by an assessment, which will be conducted by the department. All the III UG students are supposed to do one Extra Credit Course as a compulsory course.

In the UG Programme at least 6 Extra-Credit Courses (Self – Study / taught) will be offered by each department; these courses are open to all the UG students. One Extra-Credit Course will be offered in each semester. 2 credits are allotted to each Extra-Credit Course. The duration of External Examination is 3 hours. The students who choose the Extra-Credit Courses will register their names in the Office of the Controller of Examinations before 31st July in the Odd Semester and 15th December in the Even Semester. Extra credit Courses are offered for PG Students also.

Students are expected to enrich their knowledge and develop their skills by joining in these courses outside the class hours. This facility enables the students to earn more credits. To get the degree certificate every student should complete these courses. All the Commerce students should complete the typewriting course in the Technical Training Institutes. It is mandatory for them.

STRUCTURE OF THE PG SYLLABUS UNDER CBCS

The existing PG curriculum was thoroughly upgraded based on the expectations of the academicians and the aspirations of the student community. The PG syllabus has two parts: Core and Elective. The minimum number of credits to be earned by a student is 97. The aim of the project work at the PG level is to develop the skill of solving problems and to promote research motivation. All the I year PG students are offered one Value - Added Course and during their II year they are supposed to do one Extra Credit course outside their class hours to enhance their employability skills. However, during every semester, they are free to learn one ECC paper, offered by the respective departments.

CONTINUOUS INTERNAL ASSESSMENT (CIA)

- 1. There is no internal minimum for any paper. However, Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) is a mandatory requirement for all the students. A student must take at least one CIA test out of two tests and must fulfill at least one mode of assessment among assignments, quiz, seminars, etc. Otherwise he / she will not be permitted to write the semester examination.
- 2. Retest: If a student is absent for CIA tests with valid and genuine reasons, and if the student applies for CIA retest within a week to the Principal through the Head of the Department, he / she will be given a chance to write the CIA retest. When the Principal gives permission, the HOD will make arrangement for conducting CIA retest within ten days after the first internal test and before the CIA publications for the second internal test.
- 3. For all UG courses, the pass minimum is 20 marks out of 50 in the external examination and 40 marks out of 100 in the aggregate, that is, internal and external together.
- 4 For PG and Diploma Courses, the pass minimum is 25 marks out of 50 in the external examination and 50 marks out of 100 in the aggregate, that is, for internal and external together.
- 5. The number of practicals for practical papers will be decided by the department. At the end of the Semester / Year, Semester Exam for Practical papers will be conducted. The pass minimum is the same as for the theory papers.

- 6. The internal and external marks will be computed for 50 for each paper and the consolidation of these internal and external marks will be for 100.
- 7. For all the courses under Part IV (NME/SBE/VE/EVS), the duration of Internal Test is 1 hour and the duration of Semester Examination is 2 hours.

RULES REGARDING INTERNAL ASSESSMENT

The aim of the internal assessment system is to assess the performance of the student throughout the semester. The assessment will be done by the course teachers. CIA has the following components:

- 1) Two Written Tests (35 + 35) = 70
- 2) Other Modes (any two) = 15 + 15 = 30Total = 100

OTHER MODES OF INTERNAL ASSESSMENT

- 1. Quiz announced / unannounced
- 2. Individual viva or group viva
- 3. Short duration objective type tests / snap tests
- 4. Short answer / Problem solving tests (15 minutes to 30 minutes for periodical assessment of cognitive abilities)
- 5. Long answer tests / Essay writing (30 minutes to 60 minutes for periodical assessment of higher order cognitive abilities)
- 6. Guided individual / group projects (only for a few talented students)
- 7. Lab / Field / Practical work / Case study (to assess practical skills in handling instruments, experimenting, reporting etc.)
- 8. Group discussion (once in a month to assess originality, creativity, initiative, communication skills, etc.)
- 9. Seminar
- 10. Assignment

SEMESTER EXAMINATIONS

External examination will be of three hours duration for all the theory and practical papers except NME / SBE / VE / EVS papers. Every theory paper for UG Courses will have objective type questions for 20% of the marks.

Theory:

In general, all theory question papers for semester examinations will be set by external examiners. While there is single valuation for U.G. answer scripts, there is double valuation for P.G. scripts, with the subject teacher being one examiner and an external examiner being the second. If the difference of marks between the two valuations is 20 and above, the scripts will be sent for third valuation and the average of the closest two marks will be taken.

The students who have papers in arrear are permitted to write their even semester papers in the even semester examination and odd semester papers in any semester examination. A student can write a maximum of 8 papers in arrear (6 theory+2 practicals) in any semester examination.

PRACTICALS

A student should do a minimum of 80% of the practicals arranged by the class teacher and submit the record note book to be eligible to appear for the practical examinations. They should have atleast 80% of attendance. It is mandatory. The minimum mark required for a pass is the same as for the theory papers. The semester / year - end practicals for both UG and PG candidates will be conducted by the teacher - in - charge of practicals for the class, assisted by another teacher of the department who has not been handling practicals for that class. The latter takes the place of the external examiner. For absentees and failed candidates who wish to take the practical examinations again, the odd semester practical papers will be offered in the odd semester and the even semester papers in the even semester. However, in the final semester, students may apply for appearing for a maximum of 3 practicals of any semester in arrear.

RESULTS

After the semester examinations, the results will be scrutinized by the Awards Committee. Students will be given a mark sheet for every semester examination. At the end of the course, a consolidated mark sheet of the final results based on the weighted credit point system will be awarded to each student.

SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMINATIONS

Supplementary examinations will be held for final year regular students who have appeared and failed in any of the semester theory papers and have only 3 papers in arrear to get their degree. The supplementaries will be announced after the year - end results are published. Examination fee has to be paid as prescribed by the College for the Supplementary Examinations.

RETOTALLING / REVALUATION

Retotalling is permitted for UG students who apply for it within the stipulated time on payment of a prescribed fee. Revaluation is permitted only for the UG papers for which the student has appeared as a regular candidate.

CIA IMPROVEMENT

If a student fails to obtain a pass mark in the aggregate of both CIA and Semester Examination (40% for UG and 50% for PG), he / she may appear for CIA Improvement in the final semester.

In order to appear for CIA Improvement, he / she should have passed the Semester Examination.

CIA improvement will be conducted by the Controller of Examinations.

A student can appear for CIA improvement only once. CIA improvement cannot be repeated.

TIME LIMIT FOR COMPLETION OF COURSE

As per the letter No. (MSU/COE/CERT/Span Period/2022) received from Manonmaniam Sundaranar University on 16.09.2022, the maximum number of years within which a student must complete and qualify for a degree is determined by UGC as N+2, where N is the normal or minimum duration prescribed for completion of the regular programme. Hence, for UG it will be 5 (3+2) years and for PG, It is 4 (2+2) years. A candidate is permitted to appear for a maximum of 15 theory papers in the final semester including the papers in arrear.

ATTENDANCE & REPEATING THE SEMESTER

Attendance in this college is compulsory. A student must put in a minimum of 80% attendance to be eligible to write the semester examination. Students who are not eligible to appear for the examinations of a particular semester due to lack of attendance will not be permitted to attend classes and write the examination in the subsequent semesters. They will be eligible to repeat the semester only in the concerned odd / even semester of the following academic year. This becomes applicable for students who are admitted from June 2017.

Each student is required to have a minimum of 80% attendance every semester.

The Principal may condone shortage of attendance for a semester. In order to apply for condonation on medical grounds, prior permission from the Principal either during the treatment or prior to the treatment is compulsory. Producing medical certificate without prior permission will not be considered for condonation. A student can avail condonation only once during the course of study.

SANCTIONS AGAINST MALPRACTICE

Students should evince utmost honesty and good behaviour during the conduct of the examinations. They should keep silence in the examination hall and cooperate in the orderly conduct of the examinations.

If any student is caught indulging in malpractice even in one regular or arrear paper in a semester, it will lead to cancellation of his / her result of all the regular and arrear papers of that semester. Malpractice in any practical examination will lead to the result of cancellation of that practical. The student can reappear for those papers / practicals in the next odd / even semester only, as the case may be.

If a student is found indulging in malpractice in any CIA tests, the case will be brought to the notice of the Principal. The student will be awarded zero for that semester and he / she cannot appear for Semester Exam in that Semester for that paper. Serious action will be taken by the Principal if the student is caught again for malpractice.

Attention is drawn in particular towards doing one's work be it a class test or assingnment - without copying from another person's work or just downloading it from the internet.

OUTREACH PROGRAMME: STAND

(Student Training and Action for Neighbourhood Development)

This programme emphasizes on taking University Education to the village so that the poor of the rural areas may benefit from the fruits of research, teaching and learning. This is the sole aim of this pioneering outreach programme STAND. It was introduced in the academic year 1993-94. The primary objective of this programme is to contribute to the total development of people through awareness and training. It aims at creating a sense of social justice and social concern among the students through exposure to rural realities leading to a committed involvement towards the integrated development of the rural poor.

In the history of nearly 100 years of our college, STAND, the outreach programme, celebrated its Silver Jubilee (1993 - 2018) in the academic year 2018-19.

This is a compulsory programme in which all II year UG and I Year PG students are required to participate and it earns one credit for UG and two credits for PG students. A fee of Rs. 70/- will be collected from each student right at the beginning of the first year for incidental and travel expenses of the whole one-year programme.

Every Department will be allotted one village situated around Palayamkottai within a radius of 20 to 25 kms. After an Orientation Programme, the students will be required to visit their "adopted" villages and interact with the people at regular intervals. This involvement and exposure, under the guidance of the staff, will make their learning socially relevant and useful both to the villagers and to the students. Each department will have one member of the staff as contact person to whom the students could refer matters concerning this village programme. The main activities that will be taken up by STAND are 1. Environment; 2. Literacy; 3. Health and Nutrition; 4. Helping the villagers to attend to their basic needs like drinking water, electricity, transport, patta for housing, road laying etc., by contacting Government and Voluntary agencies.

FEES, CONCESSIONS, SCHOLARSHIPS, AWARDS & PRIZES

a) Tuition Fees

For UG Students

• There is no tuition fee for the undergraduate students of aided courses.

For PG Students

- Every student has to pay the fee prescribed for each semester in one or two installments.
- The whole amount of the first semester fees must be paid by a new entrant before his / her name is enrolled and this money will not be refunded if the student fails to join the college or leaves after joining.
- If a student leaves the college during any semester, he / she shall have no right to claim remission of any portion of the semester fee.
- According to Educational Rules 86(a) and 90(a), the students must remit their tuition fees within ten working days from the date of reopening in each semester, failing which a fine at the rate of Re.1/- per working day has to be collected from the date of implementing the fine. If a student fails to remit his / her fees with fine by the end of the month, his / her name has to be removed from the rolls. Absence from college with or without leave forms is no ground for exemption from the operation of this rule. If re-admitted, he / she must pay in addition to the fees and fines due from him / her a re-admission fee of Rs.50/-. Holders of fee concession and of scholarships of any kind are also bound by all the regulations mentioned above.

b) Jesuit Education Support (JES):

Fee concession and scholarships (for both UG & PG students of aided courses):

The management and the Government, both state and central, have come forward to help students in their study in various forms. Eligibility conditions are announced through Public Address System and notices to the students. Forms will be issued in time to students at the College office. These scholarships and concessions should be applied for only after the student pays the first semester fees in full and enrolls in the college. Scholarship and fee concession holders must secure 90% of attendance, failing which they run the risk of losing these scholarships and concessions.

Students Aid Fund: Those who do not get any Government Scholarship and who are in need of some financial help may meet the Student Counsellor and really deserving students will be helped on his / her recommendation.

In addition, our students are encouraged to donate **ONE RUPEE PER DAY**. Class representatives collect the money every Friday. The amount so collected goes to help poor students especially when they are hospitalized or in other dire need. It should also be added here that some members of our Staff have been silently helping needy students towards their tuition fees, examination fees and the like. We encourage more members of the staff and students from well - to - do families to follow such a noble gesture.

Breakfast and Mid - day Meal Scheme

St. Xavier's College caters to the need of the students by means of Government and Management scholarship programmes, helping poor students through "One Rupee a Day Scheme", vocational training programmes, and so on. Mid - day Meal Scheme for Day Scholar students is a unique and productive initiative and many students are benefitted. The college attracts students from far and wide of four civil districts of Tamilnadu, namely, Tirunelveli, Tenkasi, Tuticorin and Kanyakumari. Since the Shift-I classes begin at 08.30 a.m., the Day-Scholar students who rush to reach the college skip breakfast in the morning. The dire consequence of skipping breakfast due to travel, makes them tired, keeps them sick and leads them to inattention to the classes.

Thus, in order to facilitate their studies, strengthen their wellbeing, and energize their mind, we have created "BREAKFAST SCHEME FOR -DESERVING POOR DAY - SCHOLARS" and MID - DAY MEAL for the poor and deserving students of St. Xavier's College.

Free Education: Students who belong to the BC / MBC / DNC / SC / ST (upto degree level) are eligible for free education schemes. No income limit is prescribed for them.

c) Scholarship:.

BC / MBC / DNC / SC / ST Scholarship:

- 1) State Government: For SC / ST Christian Students
- 2) Government of India: For SC / ST Hindu Students
- 3) Adi Dravidar Welfare Higher Education Scholarship: Only for SC / ST (both Hindu & Christian) hostel students

d) Awards & Prizes

1. Chief Minister Prize Money Award:

The SC / ST (Hindu & Christian) students who have scored the highest marks in the district level in S.S.L.C. and Higher Secondary Examinations are eligible.

2) Award of prize money:

The SC / ST (Hindu & Christian) students who have passed the undergraduate and post - graduate courses with I Class in their first attempt in the semesters are eligible for the prize money award.

OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS

1. Tamil Nadu Educational Trust Scholarships:

I B.A., / B.Sc., / B.Com., / I M.A., / M.Sc., / M.Com. students who have scored more than 60% marks in the qualifying exams, provided they are not in receipt of any other scholarships, are eligible.

The following scholarships are given irrespective of caste:

- 1. Scholarships for the physically handicapped.
- 2. Scholarships for the children of ex-servicemen.
- 3. Scholarships for the children of beedi workers.

DISCIPLINE

a) Class Hours:

1. A Semester consists of 90 working days excluding the semester examination days. These 90 days are divided into 15 weeks, each week consisting of 6 days, namely A, B, C, D, E, F.

Shift - I classes are conducted between 8.30 a.m. to 1.30 p.m. & Shift - II classes from 1.45 p.m to 6.45 p.m.

- 2. The first bell for classes is rung five minutes before the commencement of the class and the second bell at the hour fixed for the commencement of the class. There will be a short prayer service every day at the beginning of the first hour in both Shift-I & Shift-II. A bell will be rung at the end of each period.
- 3. At the first warning bell before each session, students shall go to their respective classes and take their seats so as to be present when the professor enters. Standing around in groups outside the class or in the verandas till the second bell rings should be avoided.
- 4. At the second bell or at the beginning of a period, if the professor has not come to the class, the representative or someone from the class should enquire from the Head of the department if the concerned professor is on leave and get the information from him about the alternative arrangement for his / her class. The students should not leave the class on their own. Until such information is obtained, they should be in the class maintaining strict silence.
- 5. Between the class hours, students should not be loitering around the campus. If they need to drink water or to go to the toilet, it should be done quickly; if they have to change rooms, they should move fast.
- 6. When they have no class, the students should go to the library, If they have a class to follow, they should not remain in the class room and disturb the neighbouring classes.

b) Dress Code:

All staff members are expected to come to the college decently dressed. All students are expected to come to the college decently dressed and with proper hair cut. Women students should come wearing chudidhar / sarees only. Articles of clothing such as jeans, pants with multiple external pockets, T-shirts, Net Shawls, Leggings, Jeggings, Short tops and sleeveless chudidhars are to be avoided by the students.

c) Attendance:

- 1. Regular attendance at all classes is insisted upon in this college.
- 2. No one shall absent himself / herself from class without proper leave.
- 3. The staff members shall take attendance at the beginning of each period.
- 4. A student who is not in the class when attendance is taken shall be marked absent. If a student absents himself / herself even for one hour he / she shall lose attendance for that session.
- 5. Everyday the students must look at the absentee list in the ERP section of our college website; if any one is marked absent by mistake, then he/she should immediately rectify it by obtaining a correction slip issued by the professor concerned and countersigned by the Vice-Principal.
- 6. The attendance of each student will be totalled at the end of the semester. Periodic intimation will be sent to the parent or guardian of the student for information and suitable action.

d) Leave of Absence:

A) Casual Leave (CL):

1. A student requiring leave must apply for it in writing in the application form in advance to the Vice - Principal in person. The application must state the reason clearly and be signed by the student and countersigned by the parent / guardian / director.

B) Medical Leave (ML):

- 1. In case of illness, if the absence lasts three days or more, the absence shall submit a medical certificate, and the period of absence will be treated as on medical leave.
- 2. If the student is absent without leave, his / her absence will immediately be reported to his / her parents or to his / her hostel director and disciplinary action such as fining, suspension, etc., will be taken. Absence for 10 successive days without permission will entail removal of the student from the college rolls.
- 3. Students who have to leave class during a session for any valid reason must do so only after obtaining permission from the Vice-Principal or in his / her absence, from the Principal.
- 4 All the scholarship / fee concession holders should earn 90% of attendance, failing which the entire scholarship/ fee concession amount has to be refunded to the government as per G.O.M.S. No. 1537 Social Welfare Dept., Dt. 20.4.83

C) Leave on Other Duty (OD):

- Those students who represent the college in sports and games, or in competitions, such as fine arts, quiz, elocution, etc., or in NSS / NCC camps, are given credit of attendance for the period. It is called leave on Other Duty (OD). They should fill in the proper forms meant for OD and get them countersigned by the professor-in-charge and submit it to the Vice-Principal before they leave the college for participation. Those who fail to do so will be considered absentees.
- In any official tournament or match where the college takes part, no student of the college shall play for any outside team.
- 3. Those who represent the district teams will be given leave on other duty if the Principal is requested by the district secretary in advance. Otherwise their claim for leave on other duty will not be considered.

D) Certificates:

1. Any student, past or present, wishing to obtain a transfer or conduct certificate, must apply to the College office in the prescribed form. Certificates will not generally be issued at less than 48 hours notice. No certificate will be posted unless a stamped self-addressed envelope is sent together with the application. Those who want the transfer certificate should bring along one of their parents.

E) Good Manners and Behaviour:

- 1. St. Xavier's College, being a "community of partnership" of the staff, students and management, tending towards a common goal, life in the campus must be inspired by unity, mutual trust and co-operation among these partners. The following general code of conduct should be observed.
- 2. Every student should conform to the rules and regulations relating to attendance, library, college-fees, examinations and tests, etc. Hostel inmates must obey the hostel regulations.
- 3. (i) Smoking and use of tobacco are strictly forbidden in the College and Hostel premises.
 - (ii) The use of alcohol and drugs is strictly prohibited. Any student found using or pushing or having used drinks, drugs or any other intoxicants will be summarily dismissed from the college.
- 4. Students are strictly warned against writing or making any marks on the walls, desks or throwing paper or ink about the floor of the class rooms or corridors. Strict action will be taken against defaulters.
- 5. During class hours students are not allowed to stand about or walk along the verandas of the college, particularly in the ground floor.
- 6. Students are not allowed to eat mid day meal in classrooms; they must go to the tiffin room provided or to the canteen.
- 7. Strict silence must be observed during class hours in the auditorium as well as in the classrooms.

- 8. St. Xavier's students are expected to be true ladies and gentlemen, by being courteous to all, especially to their professors and elders.
- 9. When a lecturer or any other member of the staff enters a class, the students must stand up and not sit down until he / she invites them to do so or he / she himself / herself has taken the seat. They should likewise stand up when he / she leaves the class.
- 10. No student should leave the class room during a lecture without permission of the lecturer. Similarly no student should call out any student from the class without permission from the lecturer.
- 11. Any difference that may arise among the students, staff and management should be resolved by peaceful methods. Requests, petitions, appeals and complaints of any kind must be made to the Head of the department concerned and never directly to higher authorities.
- 12. College property and furniture should be handled with care and anyone who damages them will be held liable to pay for the damage caused. Stealing of college property or belongings of others constitutes a serious offence and immediate sanction will be imposed. Lights and fans in the class room must be switched off when there is no lecture in that room.
- 13. Students will not be permitted to take away any broken apparatus from the laboratory.
- 14. Lecturers and students should park their cycles, scooters, cars etc. in the respective places and not anywhere else in the campus.
- 15. Any organized form of social or cultural celebrations or activities by students either inside or outside the campus should be done only with the explicit permission of the Principal and under the guidance of the Department.

F) Disciplinary Regulations (cf. Tamil Nadu Educational Rules (1973) Nos. 93-98)

1. Students are forbidden to organise or attend any meetings in the College premises or collect money for any purpose without the explicit permission of the Principal.

- 2. No student who has been convicted of any offence in a criminal court will be allowed to continue his studies in the College.
- 3. Students should abstain from active participation in party or communal politics.
- 4. Students who indulge in political propaganda or who organise fellow students into political factions in the premises of the College or Hostels, or who otherwise engage themselves in party politics are liable to be expelled from the College
- 5. Under the educational rules of the Tamilnadu Government (1978) the Principal has full power to inflict the following punishment if any student is guilty of rudeness of behaviour and gross breach of conduct rules: fine, loss of term certificate, suspension and expulsion from the college.
- 6. Students should not indulge in any activity leading to the disruption of peace and discipline and dislocation of normal work in the College and Hostel premises. Those who are guilty of violation of this rule will be severely dealt with.
- 7. As per the Government order, an Affidavit by the student and the parent is received at the time of admission that he / she will not indulge in ragging. Ragging of any kind is strictly forbidden; any one who is guilty of ragging will be summarily and severely punished.
- 8. Consumption of alcohol is prohibited. Those who are found to have consumed any intoxicating liquor or drugs shall be liable for criminal prosecution.
- 9. Use of tobacco in any form is dangerous to health. Avoid tobacco completely.
- 10. Students who are guilty of (i) rude language towards the staff of the College or Hostels; (ii) assault or attempt to assault staff or fellow students of the College or Hostels will be expelled from the institution.
- 11. If a College professor or a lecturer by speech or otherwise seeks to mislead his / her students into activities deemed objectionable, he / she is to be punished for dereliction of duty.

Information and Communication Technology Policy

St. Xavier's College provides computer and Internet resources to its students, teaching and non-teaching staff members as a means of enhancing the quality of learning efficiency and productivity. In the context of emerging blended learning, Information and Communication technologies help the users to access academic and other resources for the efficient production and submission of educational requirements and any other work tasks in all levels, viz., global, national and local. The new and growing ICTs that throw every user open to ample advantages such as enormity of information, anonymity while connected, and instantaneous communications, may also put them into dangerous disadvantages such as using the devices and the connection to be used as a tool, target or both to commit deviant and illegal activities. The ICT users in the campus need to be aware that they are rather radically transparent when connected and there are all the more chances to fall a prey to credulity.

In such a context, the management expresses its concern to establish a set of standard code of conduct for a safe and responsible use of the Internet and to bring forth a policy that will bind everyone - the teaching and non-teaching staff members and the students - in the campus. Violating the code of conduct, knowingly or unknowingly, attracts a legal course of action.

- 1. The users are requested to apply their rational and moral conscience and judgment while staying on the Internet.
- 2. The Internet is to be used only for educational and job-related employment purposes.
- 3. The Internet is not to be used for personal and commercial purposes.
- 4. The Internet is not to be used to access or to disseminate illegal, objectionable or obscene materials.
- 5. The Internet is not to be used to access or process pornographic and sexually explicit materials or any material that depicts dangerous and extreme violence.

- 6. In case of necessity to use chat box, the users shall not use abusive, vulgar, threatening or bullying messages.
- 7. The users shall not post any message that poses danger to the sovereignty of the nation, the dignity of the individual and reputation of the institution.
- 8. Hardware or software in the college shall not be modified or abused in any way.
- 9. The college will not hold responsibility and liability for any virus that would damage any personal device.
- 10. Proper care should be taken in respecting the copyright and other intellectual property rights. Inappropriate use might lead one to fraud, plagiarism, etc.
- 11. In case of need, the college reserves the right to record or stop a computer session at any time. It also reserves its right to surveillance of the Internet usage (private or common) of everyone in the campus.
- 12. College computers in the campus should not be used for downloading any personal material or installing any files or programmes or for hacking any other device. The documented academic and official materials can never be deleted without the explicit permission of higher authorities. The different passwords used for the protection of official devices are to be shared only with the Secretary and Principal.
- 13. College official website shall never be tampered with an intention of hacking / deleting or intruding into the official matters.
- 14. No one is permitted to take photograph or video related to anything or anyone in the institution. It should be done only with the explicit permission of Secretary or Principal.
- 15. No photograph or video related to the institution management, staff, students, college emblem, college images and so on can be circulated through email or any social network sites to the public, intentionally or unintentionally, without the permission of the Secretary or Principal in the campus.

- 16. The students are not allowed to use their mobile phones in the campus.
- 17. The staff shall restrict the use of mobile phone during the office hours only for official purposes. Particularly, during the class hours and examinations, no one is permitted to use the mobile phones.
- 18. The violations of this policy shall attract strict disciplinary procedures upto termination and, if it is necessary, the college will report to law enforcement authorities any activities that may be considered illegal. The college will cooperate fully with Local, State or Central Govt. agency officials in any investigation concerning or relating to any illegal activities conducted using the college network or any private networks within the campus.
- 19. The college reserves its right to review and deal with any alleged violation of its policies on a case-by-case basis.
- 20. The college, whenever needed, will modify this policy to fit into the emerging context.

This policy came into effect in the academic year 2021 - 2022.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The College provides students with a whole range of cocurricular and extra - curricular activities to make their campus life rich and meaningful and to develop them into fuller and more mature persons. It is mandatory that every student involves himself / herself in at least one of these activities for earning the single credit allotted for it.

1. NCC

The National Cadet Corps is an Indian military cadet corps with its Headquarters at New Delhi, India. It is open to school and college students on a voluntary basis. National Cadet Corps is engaged in grooming the youth of the country into disciplined and patriotic citizens. The Cadets are given basic military training in small arms and parades. The officers and cadets have no liability for active military service once they complete selections based on the achievements in the corps. "Unity and Discipline" is the motto for the NCC. The NCC strives to be and is one of the greatest cohesive forces of the nation, bringing

together the youth hailing from different parts of the country and moulding them into united, secular and disciplined citizens of the nation.

Students who join NCC can appear for "B" and "C" certificate exams at the end of the second year and third year of training respectively. Cadets can participate in various camps held around the year. Four credits are allotted to NCC.

The "C" certificate holder can obtain a commission in the Indian Army making use of the reserved quota. Weightage of marks is given to NCC certificate holders in various interviews of the State and Central Government.

2. NSS

The National Service Scheme (NSS) is an Indian government sponsored public service programme. It aims at developing student's personality through community service. NSS is a voluntary association of young people working for a campus - community linkage. The programme aims to inculcate social welfare in students, and to provide service to society without bias. NSS volunteers work to ensure that everyone who is needy gets help to enhance his / her standard of living and lead a life of dignity.

There are five Units of NSS in our college. The NSS volunteers meet regularly and do various activities in the college. They also conduct annual camps in the villages where they learn to relate to people, understand their difficulties and try to find solutions to their problems.

3. Youth Red Cross, Blood Donors Club & Red Ribbon Club

It is a voluntary humanitarian association of students. Its primary aim is to inculcate the understanding and acceptance of civic responsibilities and acting accordingly with humanitarian concern. It enables the growth and development of a spirit of service and sense of duty with dedication and devotion in the minds of youths. It maintains a spirit of friendly relationship with all people without any discrimination. This association signifies donating blood, disaster management and rescue operations.

4. AICUF

All India Catholic University Federation helps the students to gain maturity through leadership camps, awareness camps, street plays, etc., so that they can involve themselves fully in the task of ushering in a positive social change.

5. St. Vincent de Paul Society (S.V. P.)

This society takes the students to the poor who need material, psychological and emotional help. Students are exposed to the conditions of the poor and learn to be generous, compassionate and charitable.

6. Sports and Games

St. Xavier's has always given due importance to sports and games. Students continue to distinguish themselves in sports and games, especially in volleyball, hockey, basketball, football and athletics, and are given available and regular practices. They participate in the intercollegiate tournaments, in the university, in the district and in the state and so have been chosen for various professions in life. Enough play grounds are available and regular practices are given. They participate in the inter-collegiate tournaments, in the university, in the district and in the state.

7. Democracy Forum

The aim of the forum is to develop the ability of critical thinking and finding solutions to individual and social problems in the spirit of democracy. The students will be trained to participate in the institutions and avenues available under our Constitution so as to involve in the process of democracy. They will have at least 15 sittings of group discussion and training in a year.

8) Readers Club

The Readers Club at St. Xavier's College is dedicated to fostering a culture of extensive reading alongside the curriculum. our primary aim is to encouragae students to derive pleasure from reading while simultaneously enhancing their general, technical, and scientific knowledge through numerous club activities.

Facilitating discussions and critical analysis of literary works accross generous and by introducing recently released books, offering insights into major ideas, philosophies, and idealogies, the art of reading can be cultivated to the students.

EXTRA - CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The following extra - curricular activities are offered for the development of various skills and for fostering of various art forms among students. Students are encouraged to involve themselves in such wholesome activities to develop into better - endowed persons.

1. Fine Arts Club

The Fine Arts Club provides students with opportunities to develop their talents in the various art - forms like drama, dance, music, elocution etc. Students are encouraged to take part in the various fine art festivals and competitions that are held from time to time in and around our university area.

2. Quiz Club

The quiz club provides various programmes to train our students in general knowledge and to sharpen their intellect and broaden their vistas of knowledge.

3. Enviro Club

The Enviro Club is formed with the aim of giving training to students in environmental awareness and preparing them to act as agents of environmental protection. It teaches them to live in harmony with nature and to develop a deep love for it. More than that, it teaches students that God is the Creator of the environment and everything in nature is meant to proclaim God's goodness, beauty and glory.

4. The Standard Club

The Standard Club enables the students who are the future and form the foundation on which a strong, vibrant and dynamic nation is built. Children are exposed to in their formative years get inculcated in their young minds and serve as a force multiplier that has the capacity to transform the future of a nation. Quality consciousness, based on standardization, is one of the pillars of accelerated economic development and priming students to appreciate the significance of quality, standards and standardization can serve as a catalyst to improve societal awareness on these subjects.

5. Unnat Bharat Abiyan (UBA)

Unnat Bharat Abhiyan is inspired by the vission of transformational change in rural development processes by leveraging knowledge institutions to help build the architecture of an inclusive India.

Unnat Bharat Abhiyan enables the higher educational institutions to work with the people of rural India in identifying development challenges and evloving appropriate solutions for accelerating sustainable growth. It aims to create a virtuous cycle between society and an inclusive academic system by providing knowledge and practices for emerging professions and to upgrade the capabilitites in responding to the development needs of rural India.

6. Anti Drug Club

Anti Drug clubs are formed to protect the students from the ever increasing threat of drug addiction. By having students as stakeholders, will be able to gain information on who are the victims of substance abuse and would be able to take early remedial action. It is a responsibility of the students to ensure that the campus is drug free.

7. MAGIS Club

"Magis" is a Latina word, which means "more" or "greater". It is related to the motto of the Society of Jesus "Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam" (For the greater glory of God). It implies and requires an extreme attention to the divine love. Not everything we do has the same Christian value. Magis, is about calibrating ourselves to those activities that are most Christian, that are more oriented to the greater service of God. In short, magis does not just mean "more", but it does mean more than we typically give it credit for in our lives.

CAMPUS FACILITIES AND STUDENT AMENITIES

1. College Library

The Fr. J. Santiago Library at St. Xavier's College has significantly expanded its collection to 131,977 volumes and 3,915 back volumes. Furthermore, we've subscribed to 110 journals and magazines across various disciplines, integrating them into our library's collection. Upholding our commitment to providing comprehensive resources, we maintain memberships with DELNET, INFLIBNET, N-List, and J-Gate, facilitating access to 164,309 e-books and 6,500 e-journals for the current academic year. Additionally, we have acquired Drillbit plagiarism software for verifying the authenticity of theses, dissertations, articles, and projects, exclusively for research purposes.

The library operates from 7:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on working days and from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Saturdays; it is closed on Sundays.

All students, faculty members, and employees of the college are eligible for library membership, with the College issuing identity cards with barcodes for accessing library facilities.

LIBRARY RULES

Book Issuance:

- Each undergraduate (UG) student can borrow up to 5 books at a time. Postgraduate (PG) students can also borrow up to 5 books at a time.
- A College ID card is required for entry into the library and for issuing books.

Lost ID Card:

• If your ID card is lost, inform the librarian immediately. Failure to do so will make the card owner responsible for any books issued with the lost card.

Home Reading:

- To borrow a book for home reading, fill out an application form and drop it in the library box before 8:30 a.m.
- Books will be issued by the assistant between 11:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on the same day, and between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. the following day.
- If the book is not collected during the prescribed time, the application will be canceled. Application forms are available at the library counter.
- Books can be borrowed for a period of 10 days. Students can renew the books twice if needed.

Book Condition:

- Upon receiving a book, examine it and report any damage to the library assistant immediately. Failure to do so will make the borrower responsible for any damage detected later.
- Writing in margins or underlining in library books is strictly forbidden. Damaged books must be replaced at the student's cost.

Return Policy:

• Borrowed books should be returned between 8:15 a.m. and 5:15 p.m. on or before the due date marked in the book. Failure to return books on time will result in penalties collected at the end of the academic year.

Library Conduct:

- Do not pass on library books to anyone inside or outside the college.
- Reference books, theses, dissertations, and unbound periodicals
 must be read only in the library reading room and returned to
 the library assistant after use.
- Dissertations/theses are available for consultation only within the library premises. Dissertations submitted within the previous five years are given for consultation only with written permission from the Chairperson of the concerned Centre. Dissertations/ theses cannot be photocopied.

Personal Belongings:

Personal books, printed materials, and belongings like bags and umbrellas are not allowed inside the library. These items should be kept at the Property Counter at your own risk. Do not leave valuable items like money, cell phones, passports, or credit cards at the Property Counter.

Reading Table Policy:

- After use, leave books on the reading table. Do not carry books from one floor to another.
- Maintain silence and do not disturb others who are studying.
- Use of mobile phones is prohibited in the reading area.
- Eating or drinking is not allowed in the library.
- Ensure that chairs and tables are kept in their proper place after use.
- Take care of library furniture and facilities, and report any damage to the library staff immediately.

2. Internet Centre

A separate Internet Centre with 45 computers provides internet service to the students. The Internet Centre is kept open on all days except on Sundays and holidays.

3. Language Lab

St. Xavier's College has a language lab with 65 computers where students can develop their communication skills. The language lab facilitates learning a language via computer-based exercises. It provides a very different experience from the traditional system of teaching and learning languages, offering more advanced features and functionalities. The language lab offers students a structured e-Learning environment.

It creates a more attractive learning environment for the student by providing the opportunity to learn the four main language skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Students learn more comprehensively through a language lab through the process of self - learning at one's own pace.

4. Hostel

i. Xavier Hostel for Men:

Men sudents of UG / PG Courses are given hostel accommodation. It can accommodate around 600 students. The hostel is meant to help the students study better in a peaceful atmosphere and to build healthy relationships among students to stand them in good stead in the future.

ii. Mother Teresa Hostel for UG Women:

Women students of UG Courses are given hostel accommodation in Mother Teresa Women's Hostel in Lalitha Nagar, North High Ground Road. This hostel has an intake capacity for around 250 students.

iii. Britto Hostel for PG Women:

Britto Hostel for Women within the College campus caters to the needs of the Postgraduate women students of our College. This hostel has an intake capacity for around 100 students. The hostel is "a home away from home" and every student in the hostel should strive to create an atmosphere of peace, harmony and goodwill in the hostel.

Admission to the College does not guarantee admission to the Hostel. A separate application is to be submitted to the Director of the hostel for this purpose.

5. Computer Centre

The Xavier Institute of Computer Science caters to the needs of the students of our College. The centre offers programmes for the staff and students during the summer vacation.

6. Vincent de Paul Typewriting Institute

As the students are preparing for their degrees, they are given the opportunity to equip themselves with the skill of typewriting. During the free hours, the students can learn typing at a nominal cost and get instruction so that they are able to sit for the typewriting examinations. The proceeds from the institute go to help poor students of the College.

7. Remedial Programmes

Remedial programmes form a very important aspect of education

at St. Xavier's College. They provide opportunities for poor students and those from rural and backward areas to cope with the College curriculum, overcome the difficulties they face on entering the College.

8. State Bank of India, St. Xavier's College Branch

The State Bank of India is operating a branch within the campus exclusively for the benefit of the staff and students of St. Xavier's. All the payments are to be made only at the bank's counter. The working time of the bank is from 10.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. Students can open an account in their names in the bank and learn to make use of the banking facilities.

9. Campus Ministry

Holy Mass is celebrated in the College Church once in a month, thus providing a chance for the Catholic staff and students to come together around the altar of God and seek his blessings upon their work. There is Self - Development Programme for the non - Catholic students. Retreat is organised in small groups for the Catholic students and staff.

10. Counselling

There are Three counsellors for the students. Students are invited to discuss their problems relating to study, personal needs, etc. with them. Courses in counselling are also conducted for the staff and students.

11. Tutor - Ward System

Staff members are involved in guiding the students in their academic and personal life. The students are divided into small groups and each group is entrusted to a member of the staff who will be its Tutor / Guardian. These staff members meet the students at regular intervals. They enquire into the progress of the students in study, and guide them in making use of the facilities available in the campus and in the town. Students facing any emotional or personal problem can approach the guardian and seek his / her help. Parents are advised to contact the guardian staff of their sons / daughters and enquire about the progress made during the course of study. It is for all UG and PG students.

12. Internship

Since the academic year 2022-23, internship has been made compulsory. UG students will undergo 15 days during the summer holidays after Semester IV. PG students will undergo 21 days during II semester holidays.

13. Online Courses

St. Xavier's College, Palayamkottai encourages the students to enroll \ Register in online courses. Completing one course through Swayam, National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) / Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) is mandatory for PG students. UG students are encouraged to complete one course through Swayam / NPTEL / MOOC.

14. Alumni Association

All the students who have studied at St. Xavier's College are members of the association and are encouraged to involve themselves in the programmes conducted by and for them. Every student who leaves the College is registered in the association and later he/she can become a life member by paying Rs. 250/- Periodic meetings of the Alumni are held in the campus for various groups divided according to their professions. Occasional meetings of Alumni with the current students are arranged for the purpose of sharing and guidance. The Alumni can become the members of the Library by paying Rs. 500/- as deposit (which is refundable) and use the Library like any present student.

15. Parents Association

The Parents Association was started at the request of the parents at their meeting on 25.08.1991. The parents of every student are registered in the association by paying Rs. 10/-. The general body meeting of the association is convened once a year and the executives of this association meet at least three times a year. The association plays a supportive role in the running of the College and its members involve themselves in the overall development of the students.

16. Students Service Centre

The Students Service Centre provides facilities for Photocopying, and Spiral Binding for students. It also keeps parents informed of the various important events that take place in the college.

17. Career Guidance and Placement Cell

It is the endeavour of St. Xavier's that all our students who pass through the portals of learning of our college should be gainfully employed once their studies are completed. The college has set up the Career Guidance Cell to create awareness about the various job opportunities available to the students on completion of their studies. The objectives of the Career Guidance Cell are:

- To help students set their goals and choose a good career in life
- To provide information about job opportunities
- To develop the spirit of entrepreneurship among the students
- To create awareness among the students about higher studies and career opportunities available
- To conduct training seminars and workshops to orient and prepare the students to become valuable members of the work force
- To mobilize resources for the needy students to apply for jobs / promote enterprises.

A committee with the Principal as Chairman is constituted to monitor, supervise and conduct programmes to realize the objectives of the cell.

18. College Development Office

College development office was started in the academic year 2011-2012 to look into the developmental needs of the college giving priority to quality in all aspects.

19. Xavier Co - operative Store - SXC@1923

Xavier co - operative store - SXC@1923 functioning in the college provides service to all the students. All stationery materials are made available to the students.

20. Xavier Health Centre

With a qualified nurse in attendance, the College runs the Xavier Health Centre from the academic year 2019-20. This center provides medical treatment to the sick and injured during college working hours. In addition to that, out Alumni Association has established the Judge Joseph Clinical laboratory which works everyday of the week for the benifit of the general public.

CONCLUSION

The Xaverians should conduct themselves in such a manner as to bring credit to themselves and to the College, being always mindful that the good name of St. Xavier's rests on their behaviour whether on or off the campus.
